### **President's Letter**

### Henry Snell, Men Movements and Myself (1936)

"Although I had become a member of the National Secular Society, and no longer believed in the verbal inspiration of the bible, in miracles, the biblical story of creation, or several other orthodox doctrines, I had arrived at no settled opinions concerning the mystery of life, or of the origin, nature, and government of the universe. Consequently, the Unitarian chapel with its scholarly approach to these great problems, with its tolerance for those of other faiths, and with its record as a progressive force in the civic life of the town, made a quick and strong appeal to me, and I entered into its gates with thanksgiving."

Beyond the fact that this was written in 1936, a noteworthy year for those of us born then, I am struck how concisely this captures, for me, the strong appeal of our faith. While I, personally do not see "the mystery of life, or of the origin, nature, and government of the universe" as "problems" (challenges, perhaps); I can identify with the appeal of "tolerance for those of other faiths, and with "its record as a progressive force in the civic life of the town".

In terms of "tolerance for those of other faiths", we are a theologically diverse lot and each of us brings our prior religious experiences/baggage with us. For some, those experiences were painful and recalling them today is agonizing regardless of the faith or denomination involved. Our third Principle, "Acceptance of one another and encouragement of spiritual growth in our congregations" doesn't include the words "but" or "except" and perhaps mutual respect is the most basic expectation. I am constantly challenged, often unsuccessfully, by the tension between what I need, versus what others may need. Without at least striving for acceptance/tolerance, I know I'm falling short.

How about "being a progressive force in the civic life of the town"? I can say for sure that there are those of you who are doing a MUCH better job than I on this count. More importantly, how are WE doing and are WE doing as much as we have the potential to do? I'll leave that for each of you to answer, individually, but would challenge each of us, and especially myself, to take the initiative to find out what those needs are and what we individually and collectively can bring to the table.

# **Board Highlights**

There are two meetings of our Board to report on in this edition.

### July 19th

Board Members Present: Scott Clements (president), Bruce Bolme, Debbie Olsen, Judith Tenbrook.

Myrna Clements reported on plans for the summer children's religious education program.

Recruitment efforts for Children's Religious Education Coordinator are continuing.

Endowment fund proposal was discussed with a draft for action at the next meeting.

Retreat planning is on track.

Treasurer's Report: The fellowship loan to Gorge Grown for a truck has been repaid. Our income vs. expenses is in the black. The Board decided to approve budget items that were previously optional items. The County Grant Account was closed as their activity has finished.

- Unitarian Universalist Association 2009 dues of \$2,998 and \$113 for Pacific Northwest District dues was authorized for payment.
- District leadership conference was reported on by Scott including concepts dealing with transitional changes in small fellowships and how to make board meetings more effective.
- "Thoughts for Our Future," an email from Scott to the board was reviewed and discussed. Leadership development and need to avoid "burn out" of active members was noted. Scott suggested a board liaison plan to our existing activities and groups. The liaison would hopefully enhance communications and smooth working of the group while identifying potential problems early.

Upgrade the fellowship's website is under way to, thanks to Anita Johnston.

Ex-Officio Status: Scott proposed former officers and Board members be invited to participate in Board Meetings in a non-voting role to maintain "corporate memory."

Retreat: Holly reported \$1300 received in registration fees. There was discussion about a retreat T-shirt to be sold to members at a slight profit to the fellowship. Options will be further explored.

Endowment Fund proposal was reviewed and approved for bylaws action at congregational meeting.

Historian: The Board voted to create an official historian position with a team to help put the information into notebook form. Up to \$100 may be spent for expenses. The position will be referred to congregation for inclusion in the bylaws. Team members are Juliana Sandahl, Pam Morneault, and Judith Tenbrook with Don Hardin as a consulting member.

Ex-officio Role for Outgoing Board Members is also to be referred to congregation for a bylaws amendment. Interest and Skills Survey: A questioner is being developed to identify fellowship volunteer interests and current commitments. It will be emailed to each member.

- Children's Religious Education Coordinator: No candidates yet; recruitment efforts are continuing. Candidates do not have to be fellowship members, but need to be in sympathy with its mission, philosophy, and objectives.
- Adult Religious Education proposal from Don Hardin was approved to begin in January for four series of four sessions each series to be spread over the 2009 calendar year. Participation will be open up to six fellowship members at a time at no charge to members or cost to fellowship.

Chairs: A thank you will be sent to the Rockford Grange for their purchase of new chairs.

"Country Living Educational Series" being led by Linda Short under sponsorship of the Rockford Grange was endorsed by the Board.

**August 31—Labor Day**, David Plant. Most Americans probably consider Labor Day as just another opportunity for a three-day weekend before summer comes to an end and the kids return to the classroom. But for the working class in the United States in the 19th century, the establishment of a day to memorialize their struggles and celebrate their victories was an important victory. Some argue that labor unions are no longer necessary or even appropriate, and that Labor Day itself is simply a historical artifact of no particular

significance in the modern global economy. However, although the composition of the workforce is certainly different than in the "good old days" and the problems facing workers have changed, it remains true that individuals often have very little bargaining power when facing their employers and that workers can more successfully deal with problems confronting them by working together. Hopefully Labor Day will be celebrated for a long time to come.

**Sept. 7—FRIENDSHIP SUNDAY with Joseph Santos Lyons**— A More Perfect Union. Obama's national call for unity through new approaches to racial justice still reverberates. A Green Sanctuary is a congregation or fellowship that lives out its commitment to the Earth by creating a sustainable life style for its members as individuals and as a group. Fellowship members Theresa North, Tom Penchoen and Bruce Bolme have agreed to facilitate the initial discussion leading to a fellowship decision whether or not to become a Green Sanctuary. Discussion began at our August 10 service and it will continue at a meeting on Monday September 15 at the Hood River Library starting at 6:30 pm and also during our September retreat.

Some may initially see the Green Sanctuary program as another program competing for the limited attention and resources of the fellowship's activities. However, the Green Sanctuary program is a chance to bring new energy and creativity to some of those present activities, while also creating new opportunities to fulfill our visions for a better future environment.

Green Sanctuary Accreditation requires accomplishment of a minimum of 12 new or revitalized projects or activities. The following list includes some examples and possible projects for our fellowship to consider or use as idea generators to create our own.

## Green Sanctuary Potential Activities and Projects

Worship and Celebration [two or more projects or activities]

Include Earth awareness meditations, readings, and sermons in our services

Have special services such as Earth Day, water communion, and flower communion

Have seasonal celebrations, rituals and alternative worship events

Religious Education [two or more projects or activities]

Adopt an Earth-centered curriculum for the children's RE program

Create and intergenerational project to learn about a serious local environmental issue

Conduct a Northwest Earth Institute discussion course

Organize a book study group with environmental topics

Collaborate with other congregations or environmental groups to develop an educational program on a local issue of significance. Follow up with action.

Earth Justice [two or more projects or activities]

Promote sustainable agriculture

Start a community garden

Build and install bat houses

Join an existing coalition to prevent some environmental degradation

Sustainable Living [four or more projects or activities]

Reduce environmental footprint at the individual and family level

A project to reduce energy consumption and CO2 emissions
Promote recycling, composting and used of recycled projects
Support development and use of alternative transportation and ride sharing
Move fellowship financial assets to socially/environmentally responsible investments
